Millers Creek Team Wins In Sand Lot Bowl Game 33 to 0

A heavier Millers Creek team defeated a picked team from North Wilkesboro in the Sand Lot Bowl at Memorial Park on January 1 by a score of 33-0.

Millers Creek got off to a quick start by covering a North Wilkesboro fumble on the kick off and going 40 yards in four plays to score. Clay Osborne went the last yard and "Foggy" Pierce ran the point for a quick 7-0 lead. Pierce plunged five yards to score later in the period and Millers Creek lead 13-0 at half time. In the third period, Pierce dived over from the 1 foot line to move the score to 19-0. Ray Church plunged 1 yard and Rex Eller went 12 yards for the last two touchdowns. Pierce ran both extra points to make the final count: Millers Creek 33, North Wilkesboro 0.

The heavier Millers Creek line held North Wilkesboro in check most of the game. North Wilkesboro drove to the 8 yard line in the fourth quarter for their only serious threat but here the Millers Creek line stiffened, with the team taking the ball on downs.

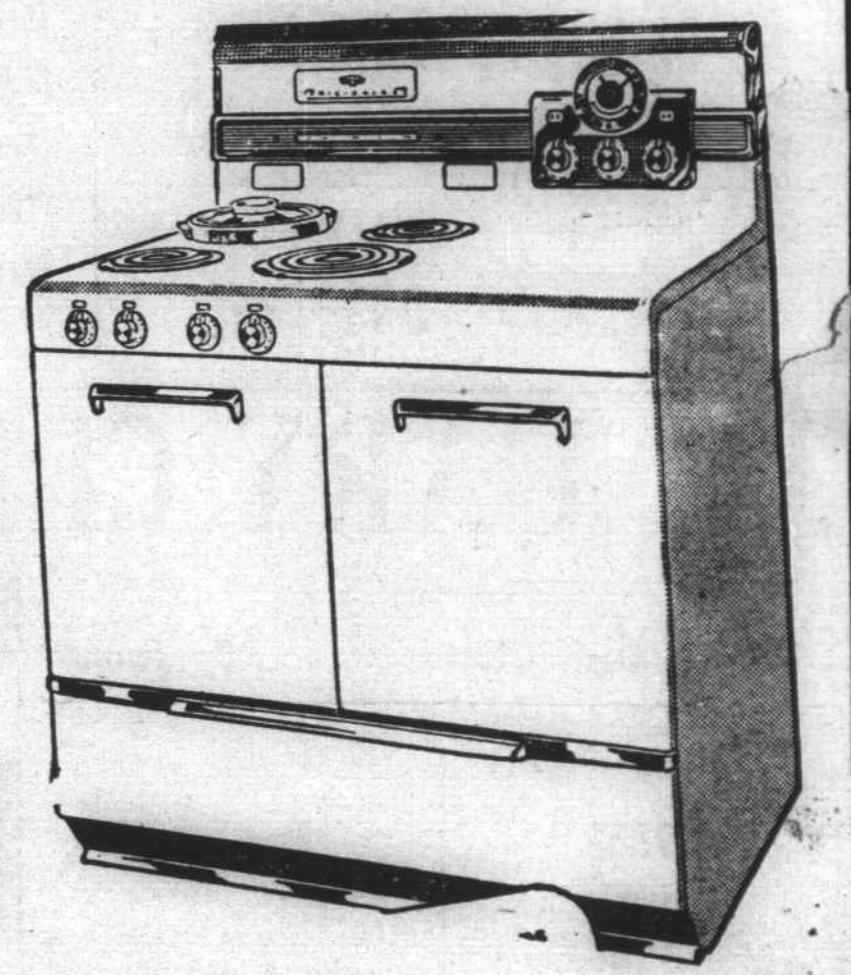
