

Veteran State Legislator Files Notice Of Candidacy 8th District

Thomas Edgar Story, veteran legislator and attorney, today filed with the State Board of Elections notice of his candidacy as the Republican nominee for congress in the eighth district.

Republican congressional convention in session at Lexington Monday recommended the Wilkes leader as nominee but he requested more time to make a decision on the matter.

For the past ten years Mr. Story has represented Wilkes county in the house of representatives of the state legislature and for four years was house minority leader. For several years he has been secretary and treasurer of the Wilkes Republican executive committee.

The nominee is a native o Watauga county. He was educated at the University of North Carolina, where he received A. B. and M. A. degrees. Over a long preiod he was principal of Wilkesboro district schools and was recognized as one of the state's

outstanding school men. Mr. Story studied law at Wake Forest College and since leaving the education field he has practiced law in North Wilkesboro.

Commenting today on his candidacy Mr. Story said he expected to wage an active campaign throughout the district for the congressional seat now held by C. B. Deane, Democrat, who is candidate for renomination.
