Four Republicans, five Democrats and one independent will seek the office now held by Sheriff C. G. Poindexter, Republican, who is retiring from the office after eight years because of

ill health. The Republicans are Claude E. Billings, Jr., Fred Myers, R. W. (Bob) Edwards, and Walter W. Gambill. The Independent candidate who will not be in the primary but who will be on the ticket in the fall election is W. M. Pardue.

Democrats who have filed for sheriff are Geno Walsh, Dave Hall, Freelin C. Johnson, C. E. Jenkins, Jr., and Carlyle Ingle. The last named three filed on Saturday afternoon.

The only other contest for nomination for county office finds three seeking the Republican nomination for clerk of the superior court. The office is now held by C. C. Hayes, who will retire at the end of this term after 16 years in the office. The candidates are Miss Cora Caudill, M. W. Greene and W. S. Fletchen The Democratic nominee for clerk of court is R. L. Walsh.

For house of representatives the nominees are F. J. McDuffie, Republican, and Democrat.
