Notice is hereby given that Central Telephone Company has filed a petition with the North Carolina Utilities Commission stating that its earnings are inadequate and insufficient to insure the maintenance of reasonable adequate and efficient telephone service for its subscribers; that continued high costs of operation including successive general wage increases has had a continuing downward effect on the Company's earnings; that the present rate of return is insufficient to maintain its credit and attract new capital for the continuance of its service improvement and expansion program.

Central Telephone Company's petition relative to charges for telephone service at North Wilkesboro, North Carolina, requests authority to:

1. Establish the following rates for Business Service at North Wilkesboro: Individual Line \$6.25; 2-Party Line \$5.40; 4-Party Line \$4.75; Rural Multi-Party Line \$3.25; Extension Stations \$1.50; Service Line Stations \$1.00 per month, minimum per line per month \$6.00.

2. Establish the following rates for Residence Service at North Wilkesboro: Individual Line \$3.90; 2-Party Line \$3.10; 4-Party Line \$2.25; Rural Multi-Party Line \$2.25; Extension Stations \$1.00; Service Line Stations \$1.00 per month, minimum per line per month \$6.00.

3. Amend Section 6, General Exchange Tariff to increase rates generally for Service Connection Charges.

4. Amend Section 7, General Exchange Tariff to increase rates of Private Branch Exchange switchboards.

5. Amend Section 8, General Exchange Tariff to withdraw provisions for Toll Terminals.

6. Amend Section 9, General Exchange Tariff to standardize rates for Class B service line trunks and to increase rates for Service Station Leased Lines.

7. Amend Section 10, General Exchange Tariff to bill mileage charges as an item separate from the guarantee on Semi-Public telephones.

8. Amend Section 15, General Exchange Tariff to withdraw provisions for Auxiliary Line Service in North Wilkesboro.

9. Amend Section 16, General Exchange Tariff to increase rates for exchange line mileage.

10. Amend Section 17, General Exchange Tariff to establish charges for installations of extra length cords.
