Rain has caused postponement of the last four games scheduled for the North Wilkesboro Flashers, who because of rain haven't been able to complete a game since last Wednesday night.

Rain cancelled the game here Thursday night and at Mount Airy Friday night. On Saturday night the Flashers were definitely "on" and had pounded out a 3-0 lead over Elkin at Elkin when the rains came in the fourth inning to nullify the start.

Elkin came here Sunday afternoon and the rain started the same time as the game, which was called in the top of the second with the score 0-0.


