Expecting Record Number Summer School At A.S.T.C.

Boone — The Appalachian State Teachers college, summer school, the first term of which will open on June 8, is expected to bring to Boone one of the largest student bodies ever to assemble at the college. According to college authorities, all available dormitory space has been taken since last winter, and there is a long waiting list. However, several hundred students will find accommodations in the town, and in the area surrounding Boone.

The Graduate School will attract in-service teachers, and others who are studying toward the master's degree, from many sections of the nation. Among the visiting professors on the Graduate School is Dr. A. L. Thomason, who is teaching near Walnut Grove.
