Government Jobs Increase By 1,417

WASHINGTON — Government employment climbed 1,417 in April over March, the Byrd committee on reduction of nonessential expenditures reported today. The chairman, Senator Byrd (Democrat) of Virginia, said in a statement, however, that there were significant decreases in the Postoffice Department and the Veterans Administration.

The Post Office cut 3,165 persons off its rolls in March and April with most of the reductions coming before the recent order to curtail daily mail delivery, Byrd said.

He said the Veterans Administration lopped 3,248 off the rolls in April when it passed the peak of the veteran's insurance refund program.
