Boone — Appalachian State Teachers college announces three two-weeks summer terms to accommodate those teachers who feel that they cannot attend a summer term of six weeks. A maximum of four quarter hours may be earned in a two weeks term.

The first term begins July 3 and ends July 15. The second will run from July 18 through the 29th.

Undergraduate courses offered for both terms include: Education 44, observation in the primary grades; Education 445, observation in the elementary grades; Education 475, observation in the high school, and Education 477, the use of library resources in teaching.

Courses for which graduate or undergraduate credit is allowed are as follows: English 420, in-

terpretation and appreciation of poetry, second term only; Education 450, school public relations, long range planning, second term only; Education 451, school public relations, the intensive campaign, second term only; Education 490, educational psychology, first and second terms; Education 491, the elementary curriculum, first and second terms.

The third term will extend from July 31 through August 12. Listed as Education 525, this is a supervisor's workshop, planned for county supervisors, city supervisors, and students who plan to become supervisors. Dr. Mildred Swearington, member of the department of education at Florida State University, will direct the

workshop. Dr. Swearington has been a county supervisor, and for some years was supervisor of elementary education for the Florida State Department of Education.
