Members of the Pastime bridge club and two extra guests, Mrs. I. L. Grogan and Mrs. Maurice

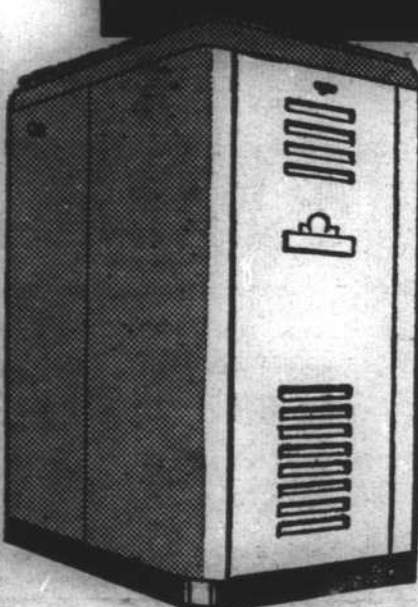

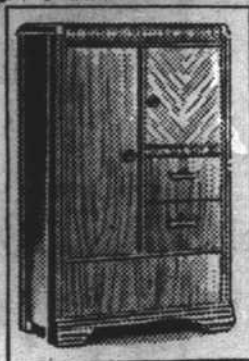

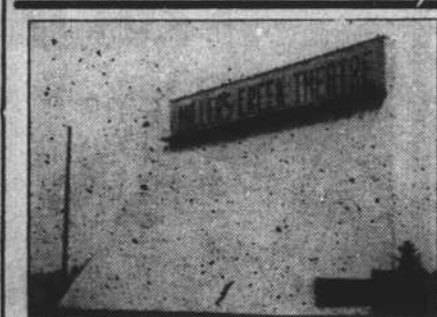
