Nichols-Mayes Engagement Announced

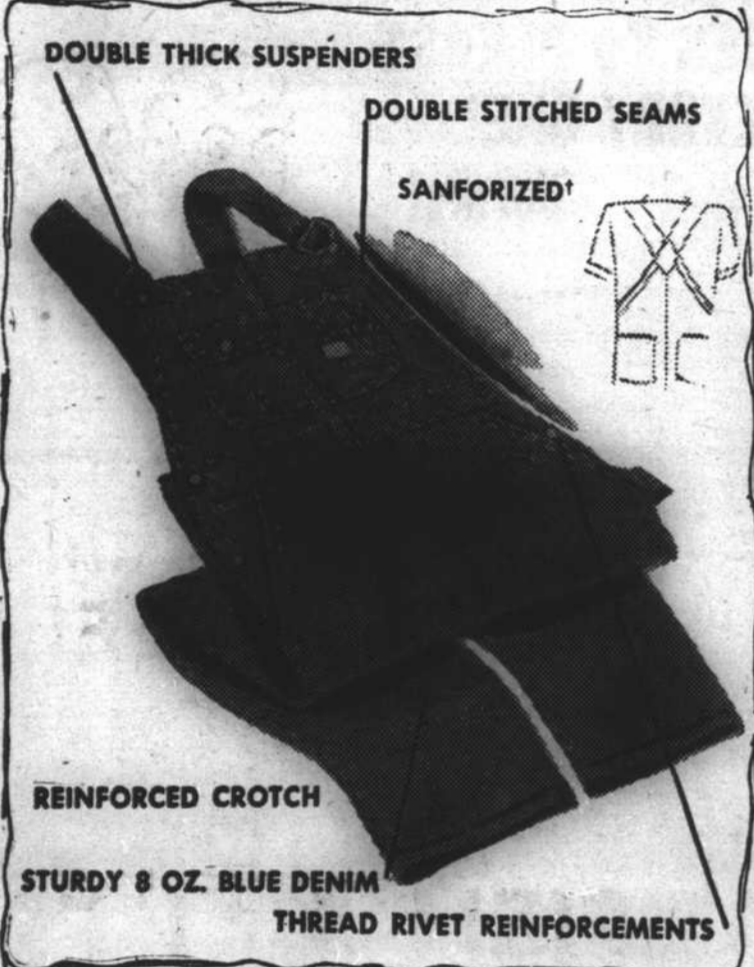
