STATE MEDICAL SOCIETY—The State Medical Society met in this city on Wednesday last, and was largely attended by the most prominent physicians from all parts of the State. We had been kindly invited to be present during its sittings, but were prevented by sickness on Wednesday, and by unavoidable absence during the remainder of the session. Consequently, at this writing, (Tuesday) we have not been able to inform ourselves as to the doings of the society on the occasion. We are informed, however, that the Society had a most pleasant time, and the members were hospitably entertained by some of our leading citizens. While in Salem, on Saturday last, a friend informed us that our worthy fellow-citizen, Hon. F. E. Shober, was made an Honorary M. D., by the society, in consideration of his elegant hospitality and his many excellent qualities, but we suppose he was merely quizzing us.

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of Mr. Wm. H. Lippitt, of our city. He died yesterday afternoon, after a brief illness, and his death is lamented by all. He was an estimable gentleman, and leaves an affectionate family and many warm friends to mourn his loss.—*Wt. Star.*

RAILROAD MEETING IN SALISBURY.

A large meeting of the citizens of Salisbury was held in the Town Hall previous to Saturday, May 16th, 1869.

Maj. W. M. Robbins was called to the chair, and Dr. C. A. Henderson, appointed Secretary.

The Chairman explained the object of the meeting to be, the taking of proper steps to aid in building the Western Railroad.

On motion of Mayor Long, a committee of five was appointed by the citizen body, consisting of Mayor Long, Dr. J. W. Hall, Messrs. P. P. Meoony, Thomas E. Brown, and Robert Smith, to report resolutions for the consideration of the meeting. The committee reported the following:

Resolved, That we have learned that the Stockholders of the Western Railroad, at their meeting in Fayetteville, on the 5th inst., located said road so as to make Salisbury its point of intersection with the N. C. Railroad. Therefore,

Resolved, That we hereby express our high gratification at this location of said road, being assured that no other could have been so beneficial to the greatest number of the people of this State, and to the State itself, which has invested largely in this enterprise.

Resolved, That this location was evidently considered the proper one by the General Assembly, as is proved by the fact that the Assembly modified the Charter in such a manner as to authorize and encourage the location in this point, so that, in choosing this route, the parties concerned have only carried out the views of the highest legislative power.

Resolved, That we earnestly call upon the Commissioners of Rowan County to submit to a vote of the citizens, the question of making a road from Salisbury to the city of Raleigh, and

Resolved, That such a subscription would be sound financial policy to the County, because the enhanced value of property would more than pay the outlay, independently of any profits from the investment, derived directly by way of dividends on the stock.

Resolved, That we call upon men of property in town and county to send their road liberally, in the sincere belief that it will be one of the best paying roads in the State.

Resolved, That subscriptions of lands will not only aid the road, but may be made the means of putting said lands on market to actual settlers, thus inviting immigration and tending to build up immensely this section of the State.

Resolved, That liberal subscriptions here, will cause the construction of said road to be completed at an early date, thus ensuring its early completion to this point, besides giving us an immediate increase of business and prosperity.

Resolved, That now is the time for every man of public spirit to put his shoulder to the wheel, and push forward this, and our other favorite Railroad projects, with an energy and industry of effort worthy of the occasion. These resolutions were unanimously adopted. Mayor Long, then offered the following, which was also adopted.

Resolved, That the thanks of this meeting are hereby tendered to Senator Davis and Mr. George Graham of Mont-

gomery, and to others, Directors of said Road for their determined efforts to have the same located where the Legislature intended, and where it will best repay the State for her outlay.

On motion of Kerr Craige, Esq., a committee of three was appointed by the Chairman, consisting of Messrs Kerr Craige, F. E. Shober, and Mayor Long, to confer with the Board of County Commissioners in regard to the matter of a County subscription, and to present them—said Board, with a copy of the Resolutions adopted on that subject by this meeting. It was also moved and carried, that the Chairman, Mai Robbins, be added to this Committee.

Brief, but practical and forcible remarks were made by Dr. Hall, Col. Shober, Mayor Long, Mr. Craige and other gentlemen. The meeting ordered a copy of its proceedings to be sent to the papers of Salisbury and Fayetteville, with a request for publication; and asking also the papers of Raleigh and Wilmington and all others friendly to our object to copy the same.

The meeting then adjourned with the unanimous determination to spare no effort to push forward the Railroad enterprises in which, we are specially interested, and to make Salisbury what her position entitles her to become, the Athens of Western North Carolina.

MEETING OF THE STOCKHOLDERS OF THE EASTERN AND WESTERN DIVISIONS OF THE WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA RAILROAD.

At a joint meeting of the Stockholders of the Eastern and Western Divisions of the Western North Carolina Railroad Company, held in the town of Morganton, in the County of Burke, and State of North Carolina, on the 4th day of May, 1869, in pursuance of a joint call for such meeting, made by J. J. Hart, Esq., President of the Eastern Division of said road, and George W. Swenson, Esq., President of the Western Division of said road, whereof due notice was given; and in pursuance of resolutions passed by the Stockholders of the Eastern and Western Divisions, in lawful meeting by them respectively held in the town of Morganton, on the day and year aforesaid—on motion of Hon. Z. B. Vance for temporary organization, M. S. McCulke, Esq., was called to the Chair, and G. M. Roberts, Esq., was appointed Secretary.

On motion of N. W. Woodin, Esq., a committee of two gentlemen from each Division was appointed by the Chair to verify proxies, and ascertain if a quorum of Stockholders was present. The Chair appointed for the Eastern Division, Thos. G. Walton and Robt. F. Simonon, and for the Western Division, G. M. Roberts, and R. W. Pulliam. The Committee up on inquiry and due examination, and in pursuance of the provisions of the charter, reported present by proxy or in person for the Eastern Division, ninety six private Stockholders, representing 14,599 shares, and Tod. R. Caldwell, proxy for the State, representing 26,600 shares; and for the Western Division, forty three private Stockholders representing 19,961 shares, and General R. M. Henry, proxy for the State, representing 40,000 shares, being a large majority for the stock in each Division of said Road.

The report of the Committee having been adopted, on motion of Paul R. Caldwell, Gen. Robt. M. Henry, of Mecklenburg, was elected President of the joint meeting of Stockholders, and G. P. Edwin and R. W. Pulliam appointed Secretaries. The permanent organization thus organized, Gen. T. L. Clingman submitted the following preamble and resolutions:

WHEREAS, At a meeting of the Stockholders of the Western North Carolina Railroad Company, held in the town of Morganton, on the 7th day of April, 1869, a portion of the Stockholders, were authorized and we are, it now appears that a still larger amount of the stock is represented in the present meeting, now therefore be it

Resolved, That the action of the said former meeting accepting the amendment to the act incorporating the Western North Carolina Railroad Company and all amendments thereto, and the said amendments being entitled "An Act amendatory of the act to incorporate the Western North Carolina Railroad Company," ratified the 15th day of February, 1865, and of all other acts amendatory thereof, passed at the present session of the General Assembly, be and be ratified on the 30th day of January, 1869, and an act entitled "An Act supplemental to and amendatory of an act to incorporate the Western North Carolina Railroad Company," ratified the 15th day of February, 1865, and of all other acts amendatory thereof, ratified the 1st day of April, 1869, is hereby ratified and ratified in all respects, and the said acts are accepted and made a part of the charter of the said Western North Carolina Railroad Company.

The preamble and resolution were unanimously adopted. General Clingman then moved that the Presidents of the Eastern and Western Divisions of the Western North Carolina Railroad, be requested to certify to the Governor the unanimous acceptance of the amendments to the charter, as proposed by the General Assembly, indicated and defined in the foregoing preamble and resolution; and that the proceedings of this meeting be furnished the press of North Carolina for publication by the Secretaries.

The meeting then adjourned sine die. ROBT. M. HENRY, President.

SECRET POLITICAL SOCIETIES.

We copy the above, for the purpose of expressing regret that efforts are still being made to keep alive secret political societies. If our Republican friends favor and assist in keeping up such secret political combinations as the "Heroes of America" and the "Loyal" or "Union League," how can they fairly or consistently denounce and abuse opposition secret societies? We opposed "Know-Nothingism," and the Standard, under the able lead of Gov. Holden, did noble work against it because it was a secret political organization. We are still opposed to such dangerous combinations, no matter what party recognizes or encourages them. If there is such a thing as a "Ku Klux" society we are much opposed to that as to the secret organizations of the Republican party—let everything of the sort be broken up, and let party men of both parties work for their respective parties openly and fairly, and not sneak off into hiding places and undertake to bind men with oaths and secret obligations to vote for a particular candidate or support a particular party.

A man who acts unfairly or dishonestly in politics is justly liable to the suspicion of acting dishonestly in other matters. The elections are all over, and the plea of political excitement cannot even be made to justify the concealment of secret oaths and political societies. The leaders of such societies deceive the ignorant and use unlaful means to secure their votes. We presume the great majority of the members of secret political societies at present consist of colored people who are led to believe that they will be pecuniarily benefited by the society. The white leaders have sense enough to know better than that, for they know that in whose interest the society pay the colored men as high wages and treat him as well as do any "Hero" or "Legionner."

If mean white men would let the colored man alone and not try to use him for a selfish political purpose, he would be a much better citizen than he now is, and we should not see him so often distressed by being arraigned in Courts of Justice for crime.

We know that our Republican contemporaries will think that we have alluded to the subject of secret political societies because we are a Democrat, but if it could do any good we would assure them that such is not the fact. We refer to the matter as a citizen who desires to promote the good of all men and warn them against evils. There are good and bad men in both parties, and hereafter we intend to favor such as we consider good, and advise to such measures as seem right and proper, without regard to party. We do not party combinations of any sort, and have no more respect for the management and detection of political cliques than we have for dead dogs.—*Charlotte Democrat.*
