Hence the culture has been on the decline .-Egypt produced last year, for exportation to England, 193,000 bales, while Turkey and Greece sent 12,600 biles. In 1664 the countries of the Levant commenced growing cotton extensively, and even flig and other fruit trees were cut down to obtain snitable hand, but now none is raised except for domestic use. Brazil produced last year 195,-000 bales, while the whole crop from South America and the West Indies was 253,500 bales It is to be noted that the increase mentioned is not equal to the deficiency in India. In all these countries, with perhaps the exception of the West Indies, irrigation is an absolute necessity in growing cotton, and this condition of course limits the production and adds to the cost. The general average vield of the countries named is perhaps at the rate of one bale of a00 lb to 7 acres, and, as before remarked, the quality is inferior.

Manifestly the cotton States of Ameri ca excel all other countries for growing cotton, since the yield is about a bale to three acres, and the influence of the Gulf Stream gives abundant rain. The yield of these States this year is reported at 2.439,039 bales. In 1859-60 the yield was 4,669,770. Considerably more than is now produced in the whole world. A more cotton is sent from Memphis than from the whole of South America. The price of first-class cotton land, such as in the Yazoo country, is from \$10 to \$40 an acre, with improvements, while in Egypt, along the Nile, similar land, but requiring irrigation, is sold from \$150 to \$250 per acre, and this is limited to a narrow strip on each side of the river.


