

FROM WASHINGTON.

The Washington correspondent of the Baltimore American under date of January 20, says a profound interest has been created in that city by the character of the intelligence from England, account of which may be found in another part of this paper.

The papers by the Southern mail having failed to reach us on yesterday morning, we copy from the Richmond Whig of last evening, the following important intelligence from Mexico:

OFFICE OF THE N. O. DAILY TROPIC, Tuesday, January 13, 1 p. m. LATE AND IMPORTANT FROM MEXICO.

The Mexican seer Julia, Zalduendo master, arrived here this morning from Vera Cruz, which place she left on the 30th ult., bringing us papers from that place to the 29th and from the city of Mexico to the 33d ult.

The Monitor, of the 21st ult. says that the Supreme Government has appointed Gen. Bustamante Commander-in-Chief, and Gen. Rorregon his second in command, of the Army to oppose Gen. Paredes.

On the 21st ult. the Senate concurred with the Government in giving Dictatorial powers to President Herrera.

Correspondence of the Baltimore Patriot.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20, 1846.

It is understood that despatches have gone off requiring the Home Squadron to repair forthwith to the vicinity of Vera Cruz and the Army in Texas, and to be there to proceed to the most available point near the bank of the Rio del Norte to meet Mexican forces, should they be sent into Texas.

It is further stated, that the President and Secretary of War refuse to put the army in Texas under the control and direction of Major General Scott!

It is also stated, that the President has appointed Gen. Taylor to the command of the army in Texas, and that he is expected to arrive in Texas in a few days.

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Another rumor is afloat, which we find embodied in a letter from Washington, of yesterday, published in the "Baltimore American."

It is said there is important news in the city from Mexico, to the effect that negotiations are going on between the Mexican and French governments, for placing a constitutional king upon the throne of Mexico, and changing the Mexican republic into a constitutional monarchy for that purpose—the king to be a French Prince.

We will not undertake to say, there is no truth in this rumor, which is not altogether new; but certain it is, that we are not advised of there being any foundation for it in the official despatches.

The following important Foreign News, was transmitted by a gentleman in Philadelphia to a friend in this Town, which, by his kindness, we are enabled to send out nearly a week earlier than any other paper in this part of North Carolina.

On the 23d, the forces of Paredes were said to be only three days march from the city of Mexico.

On the 24th, the troops at Puebla, under Gen. Inclan, who had received orders to march to the Capitol, refused to depart, and it was certain that notwithstanding the efforts of the General to the contrary, they would soon declare in favor of Paredes.

Mexico, it was said, would in a few days open its gate to Paredes.

The Vera Cruzano of the 29th, says that it learns by letters of responsible persons, from Mexico, that the imbecile and shortsighted cabinet had mortgaged to England the department of Yucatan, on condition that she would pay its immense debt.

A circular of the 24th, transmitted by the President Herrera to the governors of the different departments, delegates to said governors, the tremendous extraordinary powers which congress had invested him, and already had the capital of the republic began to feel the weight of such despotism.

Gen. Urrea, says El Siglo of the 19th, has been defeated by the forces of Generals Campuzano and Cuesta, each party having lost about 60 persons.

The same paper says, that the Government Council, after long deliberation, had determined not to receive Mr. Slidell in his ordinary official capacity, notwithstanding its previous engagement to receive a Plenipotentiary from the United States with special powers to treat on the subject of Texas.

In the Monitor of the 23d, is published Herrera's proclamation calling upon his compatriots to rally in defence of the laws. It is a long document, and concludes as follows: "It is my duty to defend our liberties and yours to sustain me."

From Mexico.—We give some important details, in last evening's Union, from the "New Orleans Picayune," (via Tampico), of the revolutionary movements in Mexico. We understand that these statements are substantially confirmed by the official accounts.
