THE SUPREME COURT. It will be seen that the Bill to authorize the holding of the Terms of the Supreme Court of the State, alternately at Raleigh and Morganton, has passed the Senate by the casting vote of the Speaker.

Rail Road from Wilmington to Manchester, South Carolina, was re-committed with proposed amendments, to the Committee on Internal Improvements; and a bill to incorporate a Company to construct a Road from Hyde county to Tyrrell, was read the first time.

The National Intelligencer says: The Session of Congress opened yesterday with a very full attendance of the Members of both Houses. Messages were interchanged by the two bodies with each other and with the President of the United States, announcing their readiness to proceed to business pertaining to their organization, the two Houses adjourned to this day, at the usual hour.

FIFTEEN DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. The accounts brought from Liverpool by the steamer Caledonia, which we anchored yesterday as having arrived at Boston on Saturday, are to the 19th ultimo; but, except the commercial news, there appears to be little that is of importance.

The grain markets, both in England and on the Continent, are depressed. United States free flour was worth 32s. a 33s. in London, and in Liverpool 31s. 6d. Duty on Wheat 4s. Cotton has declined 1/4. Mobile was selling at 6 1/2. Bowed Georgia at 6d.

The Hon. George Bancroft on the 12th dined with the Queen at Windsor Castle, and on the following Saturday, with his lady, at the select party at Lord Palmerston's, the Minister for Foreign Affairs.

The Prussian Charge d'Affaires to the United States, Baron Gerolt, had arrived at Berlin to receive in person instructions from his Government relative to a treaty of commerce and navigation, to be concluded between the Zollverein and the North American States.
