To suppose it possible at this enlightened period of the world, and towards people who have done so much for other parts of the State, and who have asked so little for themselves, was pronownced purely gratuitous.

There was a great deal of zeal and unanimity, and a most confident belief expressed, that whenever the Roads on either side of us shall reach Charlotte and Danville, there will be a most ready, concentrated and efficient exertion to fill up the wanting link. 
