Messes. Epirors: According to your request, I send you a small sketch of the County of Catawba, and the village of Newton. This County was made at the session of the Legislature of 1842 and 43, from the northern portion of Lincoln County, and is bounded on the North and East by the Catawba River, and on the South by Lincoln County, and West by Burke County. Newton, the county site, was located in the Summer of '43, and is situated on a beautiful gravel ridge, fifteen miles from Lincolnton, thirty from Lenoir, twenty-one from Statesville, and thirty from Morganton.


