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The Bank of North Carolina

We are authorized to state that the books of subscription to the Bank of North Carolina, heretofore unscrupulously, were compared at the office of the Public Treasurer on the 15th instant, by the Commissioners appointed by law, Gov. Ellis, Mr. Treasurer Courts, and Mr. Comptroller Brodwin.

The stock subscribed was then sealed with the following result:

All payments one-half of all the above stock will be required to be made to the effect of the Bank in Raleigh, on the 15th October next, with ninety days interest one-fourth of the whole amount, that on the first instalment, Certificates of equal deposits of specie in any of the Banks of this State, or in the City of N. York, will be received as specie in payment thereof—Standard.

That "Oldest Coin"

The coin found in Nash county, near Rocky Mount, of which the Wilson Ledger speaks as the oldest coin extant, dating 734, A. D., can scarcely be so old as the Ledger thinks. We take it that its real date is 1734. The flange with early tails are the arms of the Kingdom of Lein; the "altars" occupying opposite angles are the heraldic Castles, emblematic of Castile. Now the Kingdom of Lein was founded 915, A. D., the Crowns of Lein and Castile were united fully a hundred years later. No such coins could have been struck for three centuries after 734, since the United Kingdoms, whose arms are quartered on it, had no existence for that time.
