Poor Prospect for Seward.—Mr. Aaron Burleigh is reported to have said that Seward has no strength in the West worth mentioning. Mr. B. has just returned from an extended tour through the Western States, and as he has had every opportunity to feel the public pulse, politically, the rumor is undoubtedly correct.

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Harper and Murder.—A most horrible case of rape and murder was perpetrated on Tacham, about 19 miles from this place, on Monday morning last. Nancy Stroud, about 14 years of age, who lived with her grandfather, Isaac Stroud, was the unfortunate victim of the heinous passion of some fiend, yet unknown, only so far as suspicion implicates. She had been sent to feed hogs about a quarter of a mile from the house, early on Monday morning. Her sister had been sent to another pen, and a negro boy about 10 years old, a mile and a half from the place of the murder. The sister heard Nancy scream to some one, "Go off and let me alone! I don't want anything to do with you! I don't like you, nor never did." As she did not come to the house immediately, some of the family went to look for her, and found her dead. From the marks of violence upon her person it was evident she had been forced, and choked to death. The negro boy is in jail, and some white men are also suspected. The affair will, doubtless, be thoroughly investigated, and the guilty parties arrested and punished. —*Kinston Advertiser.*

A Priest in
This (Tuesday) morning about 10 o'clock, officer Ward, of the 23rd Precinct, found lying drunk in the street Rev. Robert Burns, a priest of the Roman Catholic Church, and conducted the inebriated clergyman to the Station House. When arranged before Acting Sergeant Pender, Father Burns, while laboring under much excitement, said, "what is to—do you mean to do with me, or words to that effect. The Sergeant remonstrated with the Rev. gentleman for using profane language, and consigned him to prison quarters to await examination. Subsequently Father Burns, a very estimable Roman Catholic Priest, called upon Captain De Camp, and asked the privilege of an interview with Father Burns, which was granted. He furthermore asked that the prisoner be discharged from the station house, pledging himself to be responsible for Father Burns' appearance before Justice Brownell at a later hour for examination. The request was granted. Such is the report made by the Police.

Mormon Outrage.—The high-handed crimes said to be committed by this doctored people in the name of religion are most revolting. A correspondent of a Philadelphia paper states that by the advice and consent of the heads of the church men who have apostatized have been appointed for the sake of "saving their souls," and women who have refused to become the wives of these polygamists have been family murdered, and the report stated that they committed suicide for fear of the wrath of God. In one judicial district the Judge stated to him that over 100 murders, many of whom were known and acknowledged as such, were done and protected by the church dignitaries. Eighty Mormons, some of whom are in high position, are known to have been engaged in the murder of 12 persons in one wagon train by command of the church. They charged the Indians with committing the cruel deed, but over \$50,000 worth of the property of the train has been reclaimed from the Mormons.

Bear Story.—Mr. Phillip Schaffer, of the town of Paris, Grant county, Va., had a remarkable adventure the other day. He chased a bear that was committing depredations on his property, and the animal, "impressed with the idea of his own strength," jumped through some dense brush, and finally, after a long and hard struggle, he had succeeded in climbing a tree, Schaffer vainly attempting to overpower him with a knife, the bear climbed a tree, Schaffer still clinging to his back. The bear, however, "rubbed" him off by going through the fork of the tree, and hastening down, Schaffer ran for his gun and shot the bear, killing him. This is a hard story, but is couched for by the Postmaster at Dicksville, who details the facts to the editor of the Galena Advertiser. Mr. Schaffer's experience at riding bear back qualifies him for a prominent place among our modern turkeys.

The Supremacy of the Law.—The Rev. Dr. Bacon, in his discourse to his people on Thanksgiving day, took the opportunity to rebuke what he denominated an unseemly, unchristian, unbecoming spirit, manifested at the North in regard to the tragical affair at Harper's Ferry. He specified three particulars in which we were in the wrong;—1st. In deterring the fear occasioned by the invasion of the State by Virginia for maintaining her laws; 2d. In sympathizing with the insurgents in their unlawful act. On each of these points the doctor spoke with good plainness and solemnity; and many, if not most of the large congregation present, felt that the rebuke was just, timely and important. —*Bartford Courant.*

The Scotch Thistle.—When the Danes from England invaded Scotland, and were about to make a night attack upon the Scotch forces, marching barefooted to prevent their tramp from being heard, one of them, upon a large prickly thistle, which caused him to utter a sharp cry of pain. The Scotch were thus apprised of their danger, and immediately ran to their arms, and defeated the Danes with great slaughter. The thistle was thenceforward adopted as the national insignia of Scotland.

Mr. Ward Desires to Return.—A special Washington dispatch to the Tribune says: "Mr. Ward, Minister to China, recently expressed a wish to return home, after exchanging ratifications of the treaty, but the President objects, and thinks he should go to Shanghai to settle the American claims, for which it provides." Mr. McLane, now in Mexico, took French leave of China during the late Administration, and Mr. Ward is similarly disposed.

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
