

GOLD vs. BLOOD.

The government is now in the market paying forty per cent premium for gold demanded by speculators in one of the border States for provision; the German Jews are sending northward, bearing with them the precious metals; and an illicit trade (whispered at by personages high in authority) is in process of establishment along our coast.

A Mr. McPhail, a tailor, is the facile Provost Marshal at Baltimore, and shares "bash money" with Seward and Cameron; and Sickles levies another contribution on the banks of the Potomac.

And this is non-intercourse with a vengeance! Our principal harbours are to be walled up with stone, and yet the merchants and speculators are to reap advantages from the destitution of the planters.

For three months we have not tasted coffee, and were becoming weaned from tea, preparatory for the final ordeal of independence. We thought we could endure any privation but loss of liberty, as we behead the proudest and noblest sons of the South.

They are the descendants of the noble heroes of the first revolution, now degenerated from their own ample estates, rather than dwell under the flag of the oppressor.

No one censures the President, the Cabinet, or Congress—for they have not been made cognizant of these facts of recent origin, but of momentous importance.

If, say some, our government be not adopted to the exigencies of the crisis, it should be modified. The Constitution may be easily changed.

Some insist that independence ought to precede permanency of government; and, if the end aimed at cannot be attained with an organization, which has been called a "pinch-back imitation" of the Yankee Constitution, under which English Democrats have drifted into high and responsible military positions, whence, at intervals, it is represented, volumes of information have been transmitted to the enemy, and published in three journals; and under which all have been inactively secured to the exclusion of high-toned Southern gentlemen of greater merit.

The State Convention adjourned on Friday last to meet again on the 25th of January. Why could not the Convention have finished its business by this time and adjourned forever? It would have done so were it not for the fact that a large number of members confine the time in useless speech-making.

More Troops.—The Governor of South Carolina has called for twelve thousand volunteers to assist in driving the enemy from the coast. They will be received for a term not less than twelve months.
