SEC 2 Be it further enacted, That the Governor shall have the power to use the Guarda for those Defence for the purpose of accessing conceripts and deserters; Provided, they shall got be ordered apon this duty beyond the limits of the counties in which they reside or the counties adjacent thereto.

SEC. 3. Be it further enacted, That is addition to the exemptions contained in the art to which this is an amendment, there shall be exampt c unity commissioners appointed under an act entitled."
