REPORTS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.

FROM RICHMOND.

RICHMOND, Dec. 23.-An official telegram this morning says, on 16th the enemy, 800 strong, occupied Pallard. After beening the government Railroad building, they retired in the direction they came. They were pursued thirty miles, losing a portion of their transportation, baggage and supplies, leaving many dead negro troops on the road. Our forces, commanded by Gen. Leddell, acted with spirit and gallantry.

NORTHERN NEWS.

RICHMOND, Dec. 23.-Northern papers of the 21st received. A Nashville official telegram represented the remnant of Hood's army crossing Duck river, and claim the eapture of four Major Generals, in-eluding Edward Johnson. General Cleburn was shot through the heart.

Sherman's whole loss in men from all causes, during his march from Atlanta to Savannah, was about 1000. He gathered up on the way some seven thosand able bodied negroes and brought to Savannah some 1200 cattle.

The U.S. steamer Narcissa, was blown up by a torpedo off Mobile a

tew days ago. Gen. Grant has gone to New Jersey on a flying trip. Siz blockade runners were off Galveston during the week ending the 9th. The yellow fever is still raging at Galveston, and the mortality is very great. Gold unchanged.

CONGRESSIONAL.

RICHBOND, Dec. 23 .- The Senate was not in session to-day. 170 W

The House perfected the currency bill in Committee of the Whole, and the bill reported to the House. No further action taken.

RICHMOND, Dec. 23 .- An official telegram from Gen. Lee confirms the report of the repulse of Coster's division of cavalry near Harrisonburg, and states that Torbit was repulsed and severely punished near Gordonsville to-day by Lomas.

RICHMOND, Dec. 23.-A raiding lumn of the enemy appeared miles from Gordonsville to-day, and were resisted by our cavalry,
