

At some time in the habit of purchasing stolen goods of the negroes, was taken down to the wharf, by a number of gentlemen, and there deliberately "tarred and feathered, (not feathered, but) cottoned." Cotton being the chief article in which he operated, and to such extent it is said, that he was in the habit of exporting 60 bales a year. After the barber had gone through the toilette in question, he was lodged in jail.

Riot at Mobile.—We are informed that this place, too, has been the scene of a riot. Our informant, who arrived yesterday, states that several persons arriving from this city were seized by a mob, and cruelly beaten on a perchance they were gamblers from Vicksburg. They were obliged to leave Mobile.—*N. O. Amer.*

Crops at the South.—The heavy rains and continued wet weather, for some weeks past, have done considerable injury to the Cotton and Sugar crops of the South. The New Orleans Bulletin of the 10th says, the rains have so much injured the Cotton crops of West Florida, that many planters had entirely abandoned their cotton fields.—The Corn crops in that region were, however, represent as abundant. With regard to the sugar crops, the Bulletin estimates the product of the present year, in Louisiana, at about half an average crop.

The good citizens of Lynn, Massachusetts, have lately greeted the Rev. George Thompson, the Scotch Apostle of Abolition, with a salute of stones, rotten eggs and other missiles, during the delivery of one of his incendiary lectures in that town. The interposition of the civil authority saved the Reverend gentleman from a coat of Tar and Feathers.—*Pet. Con.*

Effects of gambling.—A few days since we published the fact of a Mr. Henderson having committed suicide in Charlottesville, Va. It was stated that he had recently married a beautiful and accomplished young lady, and that no cause could be assigned for the rash act. It now appears that Henderson left home a few days before the fatal occurrence, for Richmond, with two thousand dollars, to purchase furniture. On his arrival there he was inveigled into the company of black legs, who soon cleared him out. He returned home dispirited, framed excuses to his wife about the furniture, (being ashamed to confess the truth,) and finally, smarting under his folly, again left home, wrote a letter to his wife confessing he had deceived her, and then shot himself.

Foreign.—English papers to July 24th have been received at New York. Their contents are said to be unimportant. No material change in the markets for our staple products.

Accounts from Spain are to the 14th July—they represent the contest as fast approaching to its close. A decree for the suppression of the Order of Jesuits, giving them an annuity of 25 cents a day for the priests and monks, and 15 cents for lay brethren, appeared in the Madrid Gazette of July 9th.

Texas.—We learn from a gentleman direct from Texas, that hostilities between the Mexican troops and Colonists, had commenced previous to his leaving that county. He also informed us, that the Americans are every where rubbing up their rifles and preparing for war.
