Town Ordinance,

Adopted by the Commissioners of Turboro', on Tuesday, the 8th September, 1835.

10 slaves, residing out of town, shall be permitted to come into the town on the Sabbath; unless they shall have a wife or husband in town, or shall be sent by their master or employer-and in each and every case, the slaves so coming in shall have a written permission from their master or employer, stating the object of their visit. Any slave violating this Ordinance, shall receive not exceeding fifteen lashes, or be confined in jail until the following morning, at the discretion of the patrol-the jail fees to be paid by their owner or employer, to be Commonly kept in establishments recovered by warrant before the Magistrate of Police.


