For five or six years previous to the Spring of 1834, a negro man of mine had been much afflicted with an ulcerated arm and hand, which rendered him almost useless. A joint of one finger, and a part of the thumb, perished and dropped off. A more distressing and hopeless case I have never beheld. 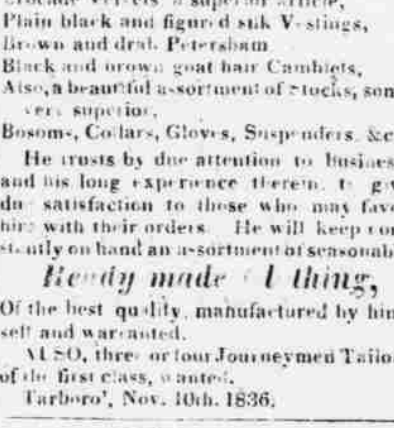

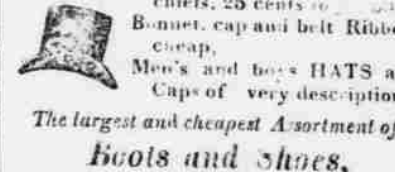
