






WILLIAM W GRAY. Raleigh, October 4, 1835. Raleigh, September 1, 1836.

For five or six years previous to the pring of 1834, a negro man of mine had bren much all cted with an alcerated arm and band, which rendered him almost useless. The older embraced that part of his urm from the elbow down, including his entire hand, which was literally a mass of purretaction A joint of one finger, and a part of the thumb, perished and dropt off. A more distressing and hopeless case I have never b-held. It was abandoned by his physician as incurable, except by amputation of the hand.




