





Raleigh, September 1, 1836. For five or six years previous to the spring of 1834, a negro mon of mine had been much afflicted with an ulcerated arm and hand, which rendered him almost useless. The ulcer embraced that part of his arm from the elbow down, including his entire hand, which was literally a mass of putrefaction. A joint of one finger, and a part of the (humb, perished and dropt off, A more distressing and hopeless case I have never beheid. It was abandoned by his physician as incurable, except by amputation of the hand.




