# PROSPECTUS The Republican.

400D

"Let there be light."

400D is proposed to establish in the Town of Washington, North Carolina, a new paper under the above title and motto. The title indicates the political character of the paper, and the motto indicates its purpose. It will adverage strongly and warmly the doctrines of the Old Republican party-the doctrines of 1798, '99-the doctrines of Thomas Jefferson. It will maintain a strict construction of the Federal Constitution. It will of course resist the re-charter of a National Bank in every form which Federal ingenuity can propose. Such an institution is believed to be not only at war with the Constitution, but the worst for to the commercial independence of the South-It has besides, many dangerous political tendencies. The Republican will advocate a divorce between Bank and State. The union of Bank and State is mutually corrupting, just as the union of Cherch and State has been found in all past history. And as in our free government it has been found, that government can get along very well without the aid of church, and the church best maintain its purity without the interference or aid of government; so it will be found equally advantageous to separate Government and Bank, and let each rest upon its own merits. A great question is now before the people of this country. It is: "Shail the people govern the banks, or the banks govern the people?" It involves another question: Are the people capable of self-government! Are they prepared to succumb to the dominion of a moneyed aristocracy ! The odds are formidable: money is power, and a power ever adverse to popular freedom. The danger from such power is in proportion to its concentration; and it may safely be asserted, that a more extensive and formidable concentration of the money power never existed in any country than now exists in our own. It is waging open war with the people. It is even now sweeping counties and States in its ruthless and conquering march. All the purchaseable talent of the country is enlisted against the people. Popular liberty is in danger. The people must rally to the rescue. Thanks to the wisdom and valor of our forefathers, the political power is still in the hands of the people; and surely it can only be necessary that they should be aroused to a sense of the danger. The Republican will be found on the side of the people and against irre-

sponsible power. Will the people be true to them-The interests of the Farmer will not be overlooked. A portion of the columns of the Repub-lican will be devoted to improvements in Agricul-

ture, Markets, &c. 
