Extract of a letter from a distinguished politician, residing in the lower part of this Congressional district, to a gentleman in this place, dated Sept. 10th, 1842:—Dear Sir: I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, desiring me to join you and others of my respected friends in Edgewcombe, in a visit to Shocco, to attend the Calhoun Festival.

To mingle with, and interchange salutations with the people of Edgewcombe, all ways was, and I hope ever will be to me, a source of unfeigned satisfaction; but the pleasure which this association would impart, would have been enhanced, if I could have accompanied you in tendering the homage of our respect to one, who has made so many noble sacrifices to sustain the cause of Democracy; to one, who, amid the darkest period of Federal misrule, when every thing augured a speedy dissolution of the confederacy, was seen doing battle in the people's cause, and by the powers of his gigantic mind scattering the sophisms of Federal orators, who were endeavoring so to mould by construction, the constitution, that it might subserve their designing purposes.

I fear, from the indications in some quarters, that we may have a schism in our party; this by all means ought to be avoided, our divisions will assuredly bring defeat to our cause, and victory to our opponents. Though I declare my preference for Mr. Calhoun, yet, should he not be the regular nominee of the party, I would surrender my choice; for I hold, that the success of our cherished principles is of paramount importance to the elevation of any particular individual.

The approaching session of our Legislature will be important and interesting; the Senatorial and Congressional districts are to be altered, and a Senator to Congress to be elected. Who will be elected Senator? Brown, Saunders, Henry, and others, have been spoken of. I would prefer Henry for several reasons. He has capacity to discharge the duties with credit to himself, and his State, and he is orthodox in politics; and besides, at the call of the Democracy of his State, he entered the late gubernatorial contest to sustain their principles, when all the chances of success were unfavorable; he made sacrifices of interest, and health, and was defeated. Now that the Democrats have the ascendancy, and the power of dispensing honors, it seems to me, that they ought to be recollected, who have borne the heat, and burden of the day in the contest.

In what I have said above, I do not mean to be understood as maintaining the opinion, that mere partisan services without regard to capacity, should entitle a man to office; but I do maintain as a correct rule of action, that when a party gets into power, it ought to appoint to office those only, who are capable, and who advocate the principles of the party.

I think it was Gen. Washington, if not, it was Mr. Jefferson, who said, that it was perfectly suicidal in any one to appoint to office men, whose political opinions differed from his, because he is responsible for the faithful execution of the trust reposed in them.

In Bankruptcy.—At a Special Court of the United States, on the 12th instant, held by Judge Potter, at Wilmington, for the District of Cape Fear, 211 decrees of bankruptcy were granted, and 60 cases were continued to the Stated Court—there being no appearance, either in person or by attorney, to move for decrees or to present certificates of publication.

Foreign.

Butchery in China.—We find the following paragraph in the London Sun of the 3d instant, relative to the last battle in China:

"Arrangements were made for an attack in three columns, two of which were gallantly led by Sir H. Gough and Sir W. Parker, in person. Nothing could exceed the bravery of the troops. They contrived to surround the Chinese, and quite bewildered them. The carnage was dreadful, being more a butchery than a battle. Ignorant of the laws of civilized warfare, the poor creatures knew not how to surrender, and were massacred. Not less than a thousand of them, including a great number of Mandarins, were killed, or drowned in the canals; whereas of the British troops only three were killed and twenty-two wounded. The encampments, and such of the buildings as had been occupied by the enemy, were burned, and the grain magazines thrown open to the populace, who speedily emptied them."
