Big Grain Crop Harvested In Polk

The biggest small grain crop in recent years has just about all been harvested in Polk County. Due to effort to grow more food and feed and potato crops to improve soil and control erosion the largest acreage probably ever grown in the County had been sown. The yield is also continually rising for the County as a whole. But due to a shortage of nitrate of soda or ammonia the yield was not as good as it would been if nitrates had been

There is no large wheat growers, practically every farmer in the County growing less than 15 acres. There are around 500 farmers who grow from 2 to 15 acres per farm according to the needs of the farm.

The acreage of barley and oats are increasing each year and the yield per acre is being increased on most of the farms.
