Polk Lawmen Are Acquitted

A jury was out 12 minutes Tuesday afternoon in U.S. Federal District Court in Rutherfordton and came back with a NOT GUILTY verdict for four Polk County lawmen. Acquitted were Tryon Police Chief Jerry Ross, Highway Patrolman David Satterfield, Chief Deputy Allen Rickman and Jailer Gary Durham. They had been sued for \$50,000 each by convicted killer Fred Constance who alleged that they had violated his civil rights. Constance claimed that he was hit while in custody for killing Saluda Police Chief Andrew Williams. Constance was found guilty for first degree murder in the Sept. 3rd 1976 shotgun slaying and sentenced to life imprisonment.
