By a 5-3 vote the U. S. Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that government safety regulators do not have to satisfy a cost benefit test before imposing standards limiting worker exposure to toxic materials. The court did so in upholding a stringent new federal standard for worker exposure to cotton dust. The decision was based on an interpretation of the 1970 law that created the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.
