A new complaint system has been implemented effective 07/01/81 at the State Level to handle complaints such as delays in processing applications or general services to Food Stamp Applicants/Recipients.

When a complaint is reported to the state office, the Complaints officer will ensure that it is studied, resolved in an appropriate manner, corrective action is taken if warranted and that the client is informed of the results within 90 days. Complaints are routed to the Food Assistance Section, 325 N. Salisbury Street, Raleigh, North Carolina.
