St. Luke's Hospital will complete the one unfinished doctor's office near the hospital and has invited him to use it rent free for the first year. Additionally St. Luke's will guarantee Dr. Salerno a first year annual practice income of \$90,000 from which he will pay all office expenses. Office expenses run about half of a practicing physician's practice income. The hospital subsidy will not be necessary should Dr. Salerno's practice grow unexpectedly fast.
