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## Raleigh Colleges To Study How To Improve City Govt.

The Raleigh City Council in cooperation with Shaw University and five other Raleigh colleges have submitted a proposal to join a federal program under which the six colleges would conduct studies on how to improve city government.

If the proposal is approved by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the program would allow university students to study such topics as the potential use of cable TV by city government and emergency medical services in Raleigh.

Mayor Clarence Lightner said there could be many benefits to the colleges and the city from such a program.

The program would cost

\$119,000 - with the city's share being \$27,000 the first year, \$33,000 the second and \$50,000 the third.

The studies would be conducted by students and faculty members of Raleigh's six colleges: Meredith College, N.C. State University, Peace College, St. Mary's College and Shaw University.

The projects being proposed are:

The design of a central information retrieval system for the city so officials would have access to large amounts of information through one computer.

- A study of the use of cable television by the city, including possible televising of City Council

meetings, school board meetings and other official functions.

- A study to develop emergency medical services in the city.

- A study of the need for social services in the city, including the development of data concerning such matters as poverty indexes and education level.

- A study of the city's "affirmative action" hiring program for minorities and how career advancement opportunities can be improved.

- A study of a possible cooperation program between the city and local colleges to hire students as interns.

- Study of citizen-participation in the city, possibly using students to help the citizen participation program.

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
