

#### CHRISTMAS TREES OF THE WORLD ....

The breathtaking beauty of "Christmas Trees of the World" will excite the entire family! Trees decorated in the custom of their native lands. All trees decorated by the Nature Science Center Guild



In their spirituals and burial traditions, slaves revered death because they saw it as one avenue to freedom. "Death is Catching" focuses on these traditions and the attitudes and funeral rituals blacks adopted.

Set in the Nutbush Graveyard in Vance County near Soul City, the program features spirituals "Beams of " Heaven" and "Were You There," sung by Mario D. Rice, of the New York Opera Company, as a background to dramatizations of black death rituals. An original story of a slave child's death is narrated by Gary Grant while enacted by the resident cast and Walter Jackson, a Durham playwright; Vicki Whitaker, a student actress from Tillery, N.C.; Mrs. Walker J. Foster, Lee Andrew Bartlett and Crystall Redding, local Vance County residents.

Water colors of the crucifixion by George Mitchell, a graduate student in the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill art department, supplement the graveyard scene.

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The program's site was selected because of this resemblance to slave graveyards and because blacks in the area have unknowingly kept many black traditions alive.
