Nation Of Islam Leader Dead

Little-“There Is A Plan To Eliminate Black Institutions”

“There is a plan to eliminate black institutions in the system,” according to Larry Little of the Black Panther Party here.

Little's remarks came in response to the American Bar

Association's (ABA) statement that North Carolina Central University's (NCCU) Law School in Durham must improve its facilities or face dis-accreditation.

Community leader Rodney Sumler, and Paris Favors, a 1973 graduate of the NCCU

Law School, voiced similar feelings in saying that it is the duty of the State Legislature to allocate adequate funds in order to keep the law school in operation.

Sumler said he would urge all citizens to write their state representatives demanding adequate funds be allocated to keep the school in existence.

He charged the state with engaging in “economic racism” if it fails to keep the NCCU Law School in operation. Sumler feels the need for competent black lawyers is now greater than ever. “Blacks should not only push for the continued existence of NCCU Law School, but also the establishment of another law school in one of the states predominantly black institutions,” he suggested. “Being an Aggie (A&T) I would suggest A&T,” Sumler added. Fraud: Homeowner Beware

Fraudulent driveway pavers have been reported operating in the area by the Better Business Bureau (BBB).

The “itinerant” driveway pavers are using the pitch that they had asphalt left over from another job in the neighborhood thereby allowing them to do the job inexpensively.

The BBB, in a news release, said the names Stanley and Staley are being used. Other names used in the past have been Smith, Small and Harrison.

The Bureau warns home-

owners who are approached by anyone offering to pave their driveway to proceed with caution and check with the BBB to make sure of the reliability of the firm.

“We suggest that any homeowners in this area who have been ‘taken’ by the driveway pavers or are dissatisfied with the work that was done get in touch with the Consumer Protection Division, Office of the Attorney General, P.O. Box 629, Raleigh, N.C. 27602, advising them of your complaint.”
