

Aldermen Review CD Performance

A progress report on the community development program was reviewed and approved at the Winston-Salem Board of aldermen meeting this week.

The report showed the progress made from July 1, 1975 to June 30 of this year. The report also included the financial status of the project areas, the type of activities taking place and the projected fifth year planning schedule.

The community development project was budgeted \$15.8 million and \$11.5 million of that has been allocated. Spending in the East Winston area is about \$2.6 million or 80 per cent of the projected goal of \$3.2 million.

In the East Winston area 162 or 92 per cent of the families in the community development project has been relocated. The

average cost per family of relocation is \$4,610. The most structures to be demolished is in the East Winston area. Out of the 337 projected structures to be demolished, 154 are found in East Winston. The average cost per structure for demolition is \$913 and 105 of the 154 structures in East Winston has been demolished and cleared.

In a related item, the Board also approved the redevelopment plans and the feasibility of relocation for the East Winston Community development project, bound by Dunleith Avenue and 14th Street to Cleveland Avenue and 14th Street.

The area has been designated as being blighted and deteriorated. The project for this area is estimated to cost \$1.9 million. The rehabilitation for this area will be residential development, both single-

family and multi-family, and for construction of public facilities.

The project for the total program covers 18.5 acres, will require the acquisition of 80 parcels, the clearance of 69 structures, relocating 83 families and individuals and conserving 64 structures.

In other business the Aldermen approved a grant

application for \$1.3 million in federal funds for the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act Program (CETA) for the 1978-79 period.

They also passed a resolution abolishing the redevelopment commission of the city of Winston-Salem.

A proposal to change the city's banking procedures were postponed until a later meeting.

tween black and white students are "a combined economic factor as much as anything."

"It's youngsters, be it black-white or what have you, coming out of homes without professional backgrounds and reading materials and all the other things connected with that. "We have identified

what we call high-risk youngsters," added Adams.

Those are the youngsters having the most problems and who need the most support services. Rather than doing the program for all the youngsters in the class, we're focusing more on those that are high risk in terms of deficiencies."

Schools Plan To Use Tutors

The Winston-Salem Forsyth County School Board adopted several measures designed to aid students in passing the state-mandated high school competency test.

In their Monday night meeting the board approved a plan giving eleventh graders four chances to pass the competency test, and calling for special tutoring to improve students' chances of passing the test.

Beginning this fall English and math teachers will allow time each week to reviewing the basic reading and math skills covered on the test.

The board also approved the hiring of additional math and English teachers at the senior high level. The project will be financed with \$178,000 in state funds. The school system will provide in-service training to teachers to tell them with which skills are measured by the competency test, and methods of teaching those skills.

Students who fail the test in November will be enrolled in remedial courses the second semester, and may enroll in free remedial summer classes. Students who fail the test on the final try will receive a certificate of attendance instead of a diploma.

The board also approved the 6% pay raise for all school system employees. The salary of Superinten-

dent James A. Adams will increase from \$46,564 to \$49,344 as a result of the increase.
