The chairman of the state Human Relations Commission has strongly urged city officials to hire more staff for the local commission. "If you're going to be

viable, one man can't do it along," Dr. Jerry Drayton told participants at the first annual Human Relations banquet sponsored by the

local agency. More than 100 participants filled the ballroom the Hauser Student Union at WSSU for the event, a turnout regarded as a strong show of support by commission officials.

Benjamin S. Ruffin, a gubernatorial assistant, echoed Drayton's theme: "You can't do it without sufficient staff;]without sufficient authority."

Another speaker was Dr. Jack Noffsinger, pastor of **Knollwood Baptist Church** and an internationallyknown theologian. He told the audience that the goals

of Christianity and good human relations are compatible.




