

## NAACP is accepting applications

The NAACP is accepting applications for the Agnes Jones Jackson scholarship from NAACP youth members under 25. The scholarships are awarded annually to high school seniors and college students. Undergraduate awards are up to \$1,000 and graduate awards are up to \$2,000.

In making the announcement, NAACP Executive Director Benjamin L.

Hooks explained that the scholarships, awarded on the basis of financial need and academic achievement, are available only to students who have been regular NAACP or fully-paid life members for at least one year.

However, participating students cannot be NAACP employees, members of the NAACP Board of Directors, special contribution fund trustees or close relatives of those persons.

To be eligible, graduating high school seniors must possess a grade-point-average of at least 2.5, undergraduate students 2.0, and graduate students 3.0. Recipients of the scholarship must be enrolled in a full-time program at an accredited institution.

Although the NAACP has established income limitations to determine eligibility, students who exceed the income limitations

may still apply in order to compete for a special-amount scholarship made available in this category.

## Arts Council seeks summer interns

The N.C. Arts Council of the Department of Cultural Resources is now accepting applications for summer internships in arts administration.

Internships will be awarded to three people, each of whom will spend a total of three months at two community arts councils of different sizes and four days at the state Arts Council in Raleigh.

The internship program, now in its 10th year, is designed to advance arts administration professionalism in North Carolina through instruction and work experience. The program is conducted to help prepare participants for permanent employment in the field and to assist them in finding that employment.

Qualifications for interns include a four-year college degree, strong administration and business abilities and wide knowledge and appreciation of the arts.

The ability to accept employment in September if positions should be available is desirable. However, people still attending graduate school are invited to apply if they have

already committed themselves to a career in arts administration.

## Winston-Salem applies for JTPA funds

The city's Human Services Department in conjunction with Forsyth County has applied for \$518,837 through The Jobs Training Partnership Act (JTPA). Funds will be utilized to plan, operate and provide employment services and job training to the economically disadvantaged

residents of the Winston-Salem/Forsyth County area through the Summer Youth Employment Program. The program is anticipated to begin on June 18; depending on the closing of school for the summer, and ending on Aug. 10.

The Human Services Department is extending an

invitation to all public non-profit agencies that wish to participate. The deadline for the submittal of applications is March 9. Proposals should be designed to impact upon one of the following themes:

- opportunities to explore vocational interest through classroom settings coupled with work experience in the public sector.
- job rotations in the public and private sector providing youth with exposure to at least four job settings, counseling and oc-

cupational information which will aid them in making wise career choices and decisions.

•employment and training programs for youth with social and or employability needs coupled with work experience in the public sector.

•placements programs for youth in the public sector subsidized on a short term basis.

•try-out employment programs in the private sector for high school seniors that do not plan on furthering their education.

## Applications available

Applications for fall enrollment for Moore alternative School will be accepted until March 16.

Moore was established in the Winston-Salem/Forsyth County School System to provide an alternative to traditional classroom organization for elementary students. Basic components of the school are multi-aged grouping, team teaching, differentiated staffing, a variety of open and self-contained classrooms, and a focus on continuous progress for each student.

Students may attend Moore from any attendance area in Forsyth County. Selection is by a random number drawing based on quotas for each area so that the student body represents

the entire county.

Because of reorganization, Moore will serve grades K-5 next year and will increase the number of students at each grade level.

There are currently 104 openings for kindergarten students, 19 for first-grade, five for second-grade, 32 for third-grade, 44 for fourth-grade and 26 for fifth-grade students for next year. Additional openings are possible in grades 1-5.

Applications are available at Moore school, any elementary or intermediate school in the system or at the Administration Center on Miller Street. Applications must be returned by 5 p.m. on Friday, March 16.

## Society elects officers

At its annual meeting, the Board of Directors of the Legal Aid Society of Northwest North Carolina Inc. elected Patricia Pegram, an attorney with Wachovia Bank and Trust Co., to succeed James Armentrout as president.

Other officers elected to two-year terms were Marilyn Baldwin, program director of Contact of Winston-Salem, vice president; Janice Ramadan, secretary; and Roland Hayes, treasurer. Hayes, also a local attorney, once served as a Reginald Heber Smith Fellow in Community Law with the society.

In other business, the board heard reports on a proposal of the Forsyth County Bar Association to recruit 200 local attorneys in the coming year to assist Legal Aid Society clients as volunteers. The society has hired an administrative assistant to support the volunteer attorney project, and predicts that up to 1,000 additional clients might be served by the volunteers. The society eliminated several staff positions in recent years due to reductions in the level of federal support, and has cut back services as a result.
