Project DARE to aid North Carolina's low-income hearing-impaired children

The National Captioning Institute announced today that many hearing-impaired children from low income families in North Carolina will now be able to enjoy the benefits of closed-captioned television. This is the result of a \$25,000 grant from North Carolina's Janirve Foundation.

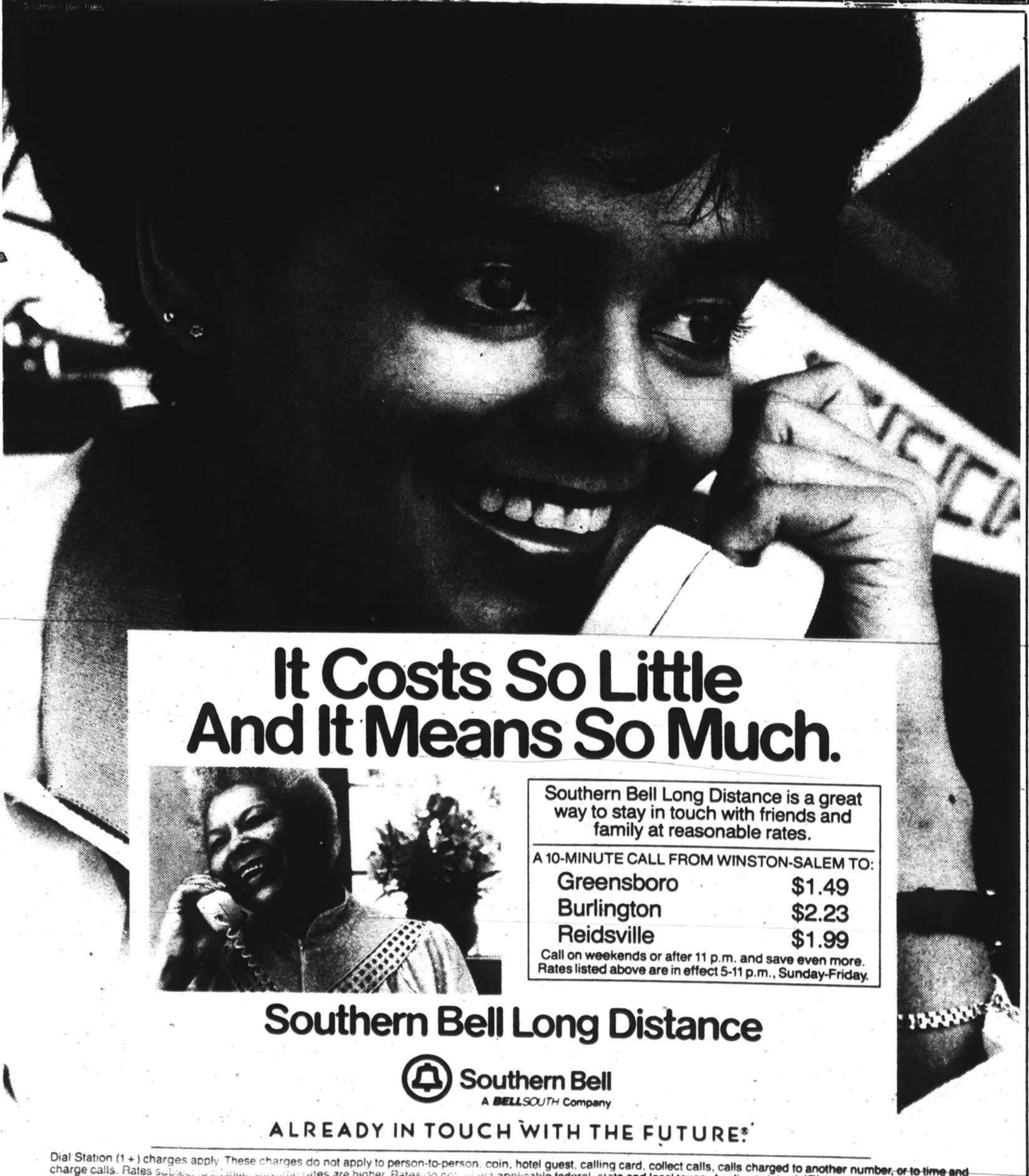
NCI, in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Human Resources, Council for the Hearing Impaired, has formed an ad-hoc committee of educators, counselors and social workers throughout the state. These members will use guidelines to screen and select qualified recipients.

NCI has determined that there

are thousands of families in the United States with a hearing-impaired child who will never be able to afford the necessary TeleCaption II decoder by which closed captioned television is accessed.

Project DARE, Decoders Advance and Education, is an NCI initiative to address this segment of the hearing-impaired population. Families qualifying for a Project DARE decoder may contact the ad-hoc committee member nearest their home town.
