But after these brides and bridegrooms get home, money management problems will begin to stare them solidly in the face -sometimes for the first time in their lives.

Marriage is a serious undertaking and should not be entered into. hastily and inadvisedly. Some of these newly married people will be

able to make the marriage and money management adjustment because of preparations they have made before the marriage. Some couples will make the adjustment because of sound judgement, true

bonds of love, former experience of hardships, wise financial planning and practice and family help.

Some couples who do not have any of these resources will still be able to make it because they will have the judgement and wisdom to seek advice from reliable available sources such as:

· Experienced and trusted relatives and family friends.

 Local agencies that stand ready to help with advice, useful information and materials.
