Bowie is rolling
When will folks learn that you can't play sloppy against Bowie State and expect to win? Virginia Union learned that lesson first hand, as the Bulldogs played close to error free and claimed a 27-20 win in another road win.
Penalties hurt Union vs. the Dogs -- they racked up 110 yards worth of infractions. Bowie, on the other hand, was penalized only five times for 30 yards.
Union led 13-10 at the half, but that changed when Bowie's Anthony Johnson took the opening kickoff of the second half and scooted 85 yards for a TD. The Dogs took the lead for good on Noel Harrison's 33-yard scoring run in the third period which gave Bowie a 24-20 advantage. Mark Fitzpatrick kicked his second field goal of the game to ice the win for Bowie.

Hampton led 13-0 at halftime, after Holloway had scored from seven yards out, and had caught a 51-yard scoring pass from Derocke Croom.
Central made a brief comeback in the third quarter on Gary Leath's one-yard TD.
But Hampton closed the door from that point on. Holloway added his third TD and Croom fired his second scoring pass of the game, this one being a 49-yarder to Johnnie Barnes.
The Pirates accumulated 328 yards in total offense as Tim Dudley, top rusher in the CIAA, totaled 110 yards. On defense, Garreth Bond led the way with 11 hits plus a quarterback sack.
Close win for Norfolk
It took nearly the entire game, but in the end, Norfolk State was a 6-0 victor over North Carolina A & T.

28 tackles, including one sack. Ten of Harrison's stops were for lost yardage.
Trojans shut-out
Virginia State's Homecoming crowd expected more offense, but they were satisfied that the Trojans registered a 21-0 win over Livingstone College.
The Trojans ran up 297 yards in total offense, while holding Livingstone to 81 yards. The home team started very slowly. Even though they controlled the

game, they held a surprising 7-0 halftime lead. David Patterson provided the half's lone TD on a one-yard run.
But things were altered in the second half, when Gary Martin scored on an 84-yard kickoff return which was set up as a reverse. Terry Moore closed out the scoring with a two-yard run during the game's waning moments.

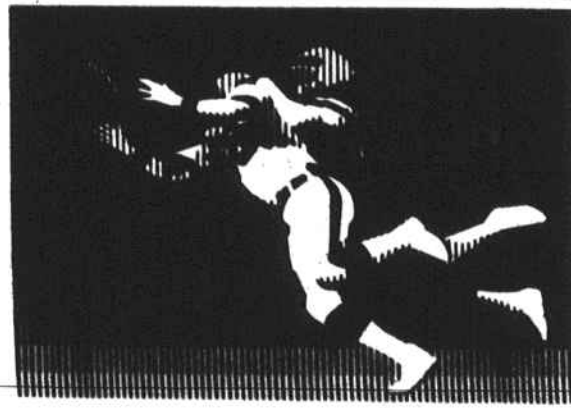

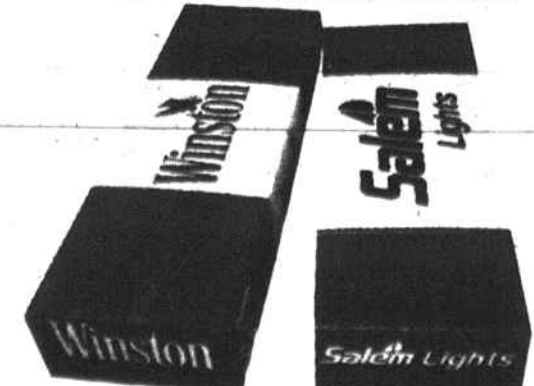
