at a convention last week, was unsure whether or not the contest would be restarted with just three players on each team, canceled or replayed entirely.

Fort, at a news conference, was critical of the media for blowing the fight out of proportion.

"I wonder whether ESPN

would have run the tape of the fight if it occurred at Duke University," Fort said. "I doubt it. Black institutions have to be purer than Caesar's wife."

He added that the fight didn't last 30 seconds and unlike the incident two years ago it did not

involve any fans.

The fight was the second of the year for Morgan State. A Dec. 4 contest against St. Joseph's resulted in two players being ejected for fighting.

(It should be noted that ESPN made much ado about the shoving

match last month in Shreveport, LA between the Wake Forest and Oregon football teams during a pregame party prior to the Independence Bowl game. According to Wake Forest officials, the players simply got into a shouting match over who was the better team and no blows were ever exchanged.)

Again WSSU fell behind quickly as N.C. Central took a 15-2 lead with 15 consecutive points and held a 43-28 margin at intermission.

Coach Greg Jackson, whose team went to 11-0 and 5-0 in Southern Division play, said he thought his team came out sharp and played that way from the start.

Gaines said St. Augustine's did what he thought they would do and his team simply was unable to stop them.

In women's play, the Lady Rams' winless streak continued with three consecutive losses for an 0-8 mark.

St. Augustine's defeated WSSU, 86-47, outscoring the Lady Rams, 42-16 in the first half and coasted to an easy victory, as the losers only managed to shoot 25 percent from the field. Denetra Parker was the lone Lady Ram in double figures with 11 points.

Ebony Moore added 9 while Yolanda Collette and Shondra McSwain each scored 8 points.

Hampton handed WSSU another loss, 88-52, as the Lady Rams again shot poorly from the field, managing just 32 percent.

Kendra Moore scored 17 points in a valiant losing effort, but got little support from her teammates.

Hampton led, 46-28, at halftime and shot 58 percent from the field as

the Lady Pirates improved to 7-6.

In the third defeat, Elizabeth City beat WSSU Monday night, 72-45.

In upcoming action for WSSU basketball, in addition to Saturday night's game against Johnson C. Smith, the Rams host Fayetteville State Monday night. They play in Joel Coliseum next Saturday against Virginia Union. The Lady Rams will play in all three contests prior to the men's games.

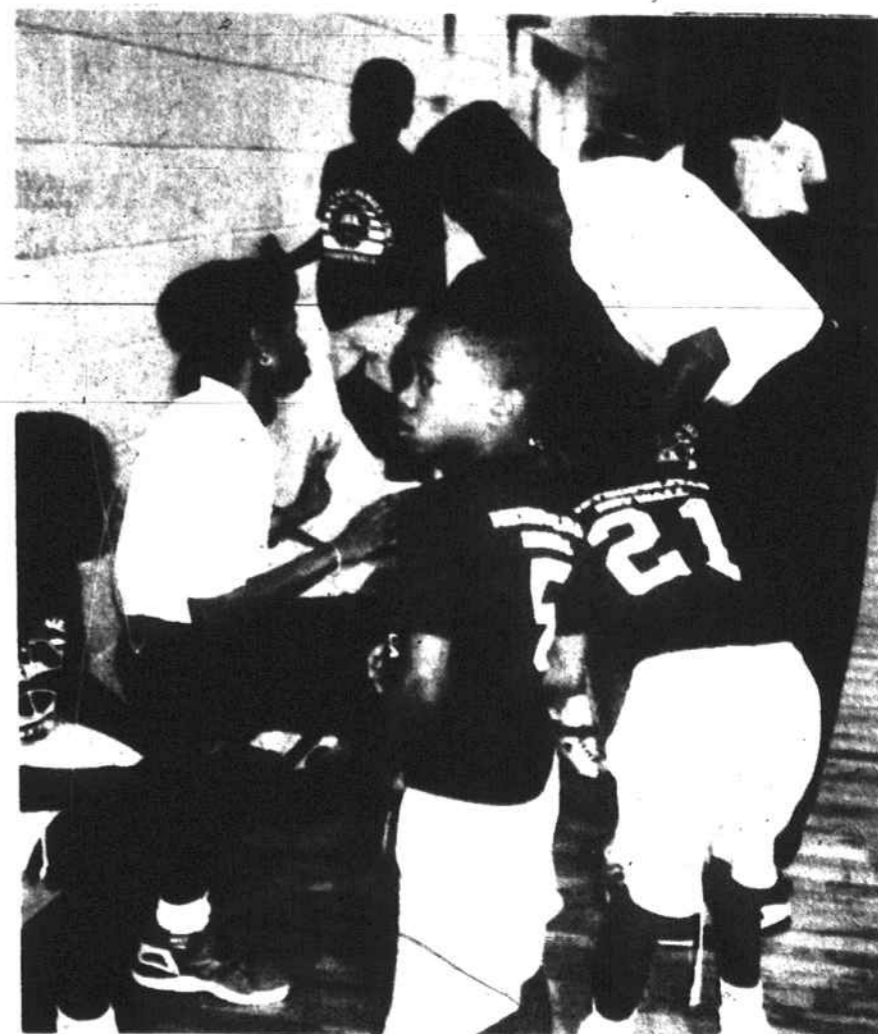
