Written by James Weldon Johnson and set to music by his brother, Rosamond, "Lift Every Voice and Sing" was known for decades as the Negro National Anthem. It was first performed on January 12, 1900 by 500 school children at a celebration for Abraham Lincoln's birthday.

In the years that followed the school children continued to sing the Anthem. And when some of them became teachers, they taught it to their pupils. In less than twenty years, the moving

words and stirring music of this Anthem were being sung throughout the South, as well as other parts of the country.
