
Wilson Celebrates 75th Anniversary Group Supports Best Choice Center

The center helps at-risk children grow up free of drugs and crime by enlisting the community and parents in the education

"We promote the enduring values of education by adapting our teaching to the specific needs of our children," said Dorothy Graham-Wheeler, director of the center.

Numerous social service agencies, community institutions and local government services collaborate with the center by providing trainers for specialized curriculum components.


"It's important for people to be in the schools to develop a one-onone relationship with the kids." Womble said. "That way they can relate to another adult and have a role model to-give them guidance

and direction. It's what a partnership is all about." Members of the post plan to


begin volunteering at Paisley in the next few weeks.


