# "Love Boat" Star to Replace Turman in Role

The 1993 National Black Theatre Festival has announced that Ted Lange, who played the amiable bartender on TV's "Love Boat," has been chosen to replace Glynn Turman of the hit series "A Different World" in the play "Willie & Esther."

Larry Leon Hamlin, the producer and artistic director of the festival, said that Turman's departure from the festival is due to "his acceptance of a new film role that begins immediate shooting."

"We are sorry to lose Glynn, but we think Lange will fill his shoes well," Hamlin said.

Lange will star alongside Yolanda King, the daughter of the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., in this fast-paced, poignant love story with many hilarious moments.

The 1993 National Black Theatre Festival will feature 30 different productions in more than 79 performances during festival week, Aug. 2-7.

"Willie and Esther" opens with two performances at the Stevens Center tomorrow at 3 p.m. and 8 p.m., and two performances Saturday at 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. The ticket price is \$20.

Those fans who have missed Lange since his "Love Boat" days may not realize that he has spent the last few years writing, directing and acting on stage and TV.

He has produced scripts for several TV shows and has directed episodes of "Gidget," "Starman" and "Mike Hammer." He continues to perform on stage in such classics

as "Taming of the Shrew" and "Lamirada." He was recently nominated for a NAACP Image Theatre Award.

Yolanda King, who stars as Esther, is the oldest child of King. She has written, directed and acted in plays for D.S. Productions in Atlanta.

She is committed to using her talents to serve humanity. As she explains, "While it is imperative to actively challenge the forces that deny human beings their right to a decent life ... one must also stimulate and alter the hearts and minds of both the privileged as well as those who have been long denied. 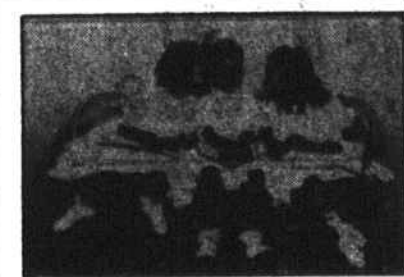
