

HAWS Recognizes Youths for Their Achievements

More than 450 children who live in four city public-housing communities have been recognized for their achievements in a new after school program created to give these K-5th grade students a better chance of success in school, and life.

All students who actively participated in the Housing Authority of Winston-Salem's After School Program were recognized before an audience of relatives and friends, teachers and community leaders. Students who performed well in school, who had perfect attendance and no conduct cuts became "HAWS Masterkids."

During the school year the HAWS program provides a place for children from four public housing communities to gather immediately after school. In the spirit of the old African proverb, "It take a whole village to raise a child," HAWS created the program by bringing together parents and other relatives, teachers, youth-oriented

organizations, churches and other community resources.

The program is sponsored by HAWS with a grant from R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co.

After school the students first complete their homework assignments and then take part in other activities. Enrichment activities from 5-8 p.m. on weekdays complement the program, with a different focus each day: cultural activities, drug intervention/personal improvement, career day, game night/parental involvement night, and teen day/Scout day/ movie night.

Community organization that have been involved this first year include: the Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Schools, the Salvation Army Boys' and Girls' Clubs, Scouts, Forsyth County Health Department, N.C. Agricultural Extension Agency, Winston-Salem Parks and Recreation and a number of churches. The recognition event and celebration was held in Anderson Center on Winston-Salem State



More than 200 students and their families, teachers and representatives from community organization attended a reception and picnic Saturday at Civic Park. The picnic followed a recognition ceremony for participants in the RJR/HAWS after-school tutorial program.

University's campus Saturday afternoon (June 25), followed by a reception. Officials from city government, the school system, business sponsors and supporting community organizations also attended.

The students live in four public housing communities: Happy Hill Gardens, Piedmont Park, Kimberly Park Terrace and Cleveland Avenue Homes.

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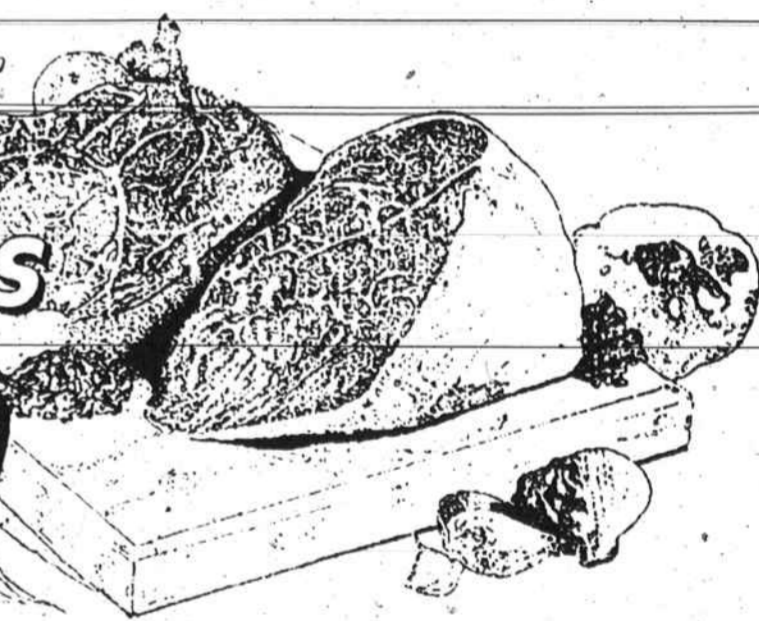
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FmHa Home Repair Loans Available

Paul W. Butler, Farmer Home Administration, supervisor for Forsyth and Stokes Counties announced that the agency has received substantial increase in its funding for loans to repair homes owned by very-low income individuals and families. Funding in North Carolina for the FmHa 504 loan program has more than tripled over last year's allocation.

Butler said that \$1.3 million dollars will be available to remove health and safety hazards. Example

of work that can be performed are roof repairs, bathroom construction, weatherization, septic tank and well installation. Individuals and families who own their home and have household income below 50 percent of the county's median household income may qualify. Loans can be made for amounts up to \$15,000 for up to 20 years at 1 percent interest.

Builders interested in contracting for home repair jobs are needed. Butler said that "finding qualified builders to perform repair jobs is

sometimes difficult." Any builder desiring more details about the Repair Loan Program should contact the local FmHa office.

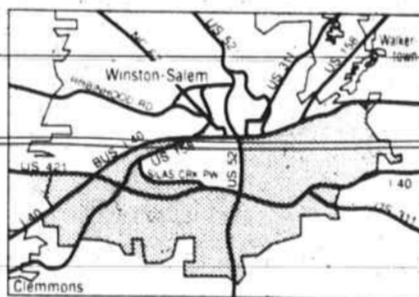

The City-County Planning Board will consider and recommend to the Winston-Salem Board of Aldermen a proposed reclassification of all current zoning in the South Sector of Winston-Salem, North Carolina (shaded areas on map) in conjunction with the Unified Development Ordinances.

The proposed zoning maps are classified according to the following new zoning districts:

- YR Yadkin River Conservation District
- AG Agricultural District
- RS Residential Single Family Districts: RS-40, RS-30, RS-20, RS-15, RS-12, RS-9, RS-7, RS-5
- RM Residential Multifamily Districts: RM-U, RM-18, RM-12, RM-8, RM-5
- MH Manufactured Housing Development District
- Commercial Districts: NO Neighborhood Office District, LO Limited Office District, CPO Corporate Park Office District, GO General Office District, NB Neighborhood Business District, PB Pedestrian Business District, LB Limited Business District, NSB Neighborhood Shopping Center Business District, HB Highway Business District, GB General Business District, CB Central Business District
- Industrial Districts: LI Limited Industrial District, CPI Corporate Park Industrial District, GI General Industrial District, CI Central Industrial District
- Institutional and Mixed-Use Districts: IP Institutional and Public District, C Campus District, MU-S Mixed-Use - Special Use District

In addition to the zoning districts listed above, there are also reflected on the proposed zoning maps the following Overlay and Special Purpose Districts:

- NCO Neighborhood Conservation Overlay District, TO Thoroughfare Overlay District, AO Airport Overlay District, H Historic District, HO Historic Overlay District. These overlay and special purpose districts may contain requirements that supersede the requirements of the underlying zoning districts.
