As of the last ranking prior to the holiday break, the Bulldogs (3rd), JCSU (2nd), WSSU (4th), VSU (6th) and FSU (7th), are all in the Appholo of Div. II South Atlantic regional rankings.

Hampton (7-3, 2-1) is one of the two Div. I teams to emerge inthe new year with a winning record. The Pirates, led by preseason MEAC Player of the Year Tarvis Williams' 21. 8 points, 6.7 rebounds and 4.7 blocks per game, have done well against lesser D-1 competition including wins over E. Michigan, W. Michigan, Wisconsin-Green Bay and Chicago State. But the Pirates already have a loss in conference play to Norfolk State (87-86 on Nov. 29). Williams is second in the nation in blocked shots.

Norfolk State (2-8, 2-0) is winless outside the conference against stronger Div. I programs like Seton Hall, LSU, Maryland and Fresno State but has knocked off Hampton and Howard in the conference.
