Louis Frazier, Zac Selmon and Jeremy Thompson have been recognized by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame as members of the Hampshire Honor Society, a group comprised of college football players who maintain a 3.2 GPA or better over the course of their career.

Wake Forest's three selections mark the most of any school in the



Atlantic Coast Conference. Other ACC honorees include Tom Santi (Virginia), Nick Larkin (Boston College), Patrick Bailey and Matt Rumsey (Duke), Kevin Tuminello (Georgia Tech), Steve Hauschka (NC State), Joe Dailey (North Carolina) and Jud Danlevy (Virginia Tech).

Qualifications for membership include being a starter or significant substitute in one's last year of eligibility at an accredited NCAA Football

Bowl Subdivision, Football Championship Subdivision, Division II, Division III or NAIA college of university, achieving a 3.2 cumulative grade point average throughout the entire course of undergraduate study and meeting all NCAA-mandated progress towards


degree requirements. This is the second year the NFF's Honor Society has been in existence.

The NFF's Hampshire Honor Society capitalizes on the NFF's current National Scholar-Athlete program, expanding the number of scholar-athletes the NFF can recognize each year and further strengthening its leadership role in encouraging academic performance by the student-athletes who play football at the more than 700 college and universities with football

Frazier, who started at left tackle and was on the field for 601 offensive snaps last season, was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America first team in the fall and holds a 3.76 GPA with a major in biology and minors in chemistry and sociology

Selmon, a starter at tight end, was a finalist for the Danny Wuerfel Trophy and an Academic All-District III selection in his senior year. Selmon also serves at the president of the Shine Foundation, a non-profit organization during charitable work in Africa. The tight end averaged 11.4 yards per catch for his career.

Thompson finished his senior season as the team sack leader with 6.5 on the year. He was one of 10 finalists for the National Sportsmanship Award in 2007 and was selected to play in the prestigious Senior Bowl.

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


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
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
