

selected as MEAC favorite

South Carolina State's Will Ford and Endor Cooper of Howard earned the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference's (MEAC) top football preseason awards, as announced by the league last week at the Sheraton Norfolk Waterside Hotel,

Ford was selected as the preseason Offensive Player of the Year and Cooper was named the Defensive Player of the Year by the MEAC head football coaches and sports information directors.

For the second year in a row the South Carolina State Bulldogs were the consensus pick to win the MEAC title in 2008. The defending MEAC Champion Delaware State Hornets finished second in the preseason poll.

Ford led the Bulldogs in total rushing yards with 1,389 yards on 210 attempts and four touchdowns. He finished second in the MEAC in rushing yards per game with an average of 126.3. Ford earned the MEAC's Rookie of the Year honor his freshman season and was selected to the All-MEAC First Team as

a sophomore. Cooper earned the defensive player of the year honor after leading the Bison with 50 solo and 87 total tackles in 2007. He finished fifth in the league in tackles and tallied three forced fumbles, SCSU's Will Ford finished with fourth best in the MEAC.

Hampton led all teams with six players on the preseason All-MEAC first

team. The Pirates also had three second team selections for a total of 11. South Carolina State had 12 total selections on both teams; five were recognized on the first team. Delaware State, Morgan State and Norfolk State had six total selections each.

The 2008 Preseason Predictions and All-Conference teams are listed as followed: South Carolina State, Delaware State, Norfolk State, Hampton, Morgan State, Florida A&M, Bethune-Cookman, Howard and North Carolina A&T.
